Word From The Pastor "THE GLAD SURPRISE"

There is something compelling and exhilarating about the glad surprise heart There is a deep meaning in the concept. This meaning has to do with the very foundation of hope, about the nature of life itself. The manifestation of this quality in the world about us can best be witnessed in the coming of spring. It is ever a new thing, a glad surprise, the stirring of life at the end of winter. One day there seems to be no sign of life and then almost overnight, delicate blooms, blades of grass, bugs, insectsô an entire world of newness everywhere. It is the glad surprise at the end of winter. Often the same experience comes at the end of a long tunnel of tragedy and tribulation. It is as if a man stumbling in the darkness, having lost his way, finds that the spot at which he falls is the foot of a stairway that leads from darkness into light. Such is the glad surprise. This is the resurrection! It is the announcement that life cannot ultimately be conquered by death, that there is no road that is at last swallowed up in an ultimate darkness, that there is strength added when the labors increase, that multiplied peace matches multiplied trials. Take courage, therefore:

Scripture Insights




Alleluia! We are witnesses to the power of God who raised Jesus from the dead. This is the theme of the readings on this holy

Solemnity of Easter. The First Reading, from Acts of the Apostles, presents the Apostle Peter as proclaiming to the Roman centurion Cornelius and his household the Good New about Jesus Christ. Peter has witnessed those words and deeds and now realizes he is called to preach not only to fellow Jews but to all people for the forgiveness of sins. This Good News is a gift for all.

Pauløs Letter to the Colossians urgently reinforces primary Gospel teaching about Christ as the source of all salvation. Paul is counteracting false teachings about the powers of angels and the necessity of ascetic practices. In the Second Reading we hear him reassuring the Colossians that they are bonded with Christ in a mystical death and resurrection.

Todayøs Gospel is part of a longer post-Resurrection narrative, which ends with Mary Magdalene being commissioned to preach to Jesusø

disciples saying, õI have seen the Lord!ö As the scene opens, we learn that Mary Magdalene came to the garden tomb before dawn. In the first-century Greco-



Roman world, a night venture would have been considered strange and dangerous for anyone, but especially for a woman, but it makes her the first witness of the empty tomb. When Peter and the Beloved Disciple respond to her summons, both witness the signs of Jesusø Deathô burial wrappingsô but at this moment only one õsaw and believed.ö
